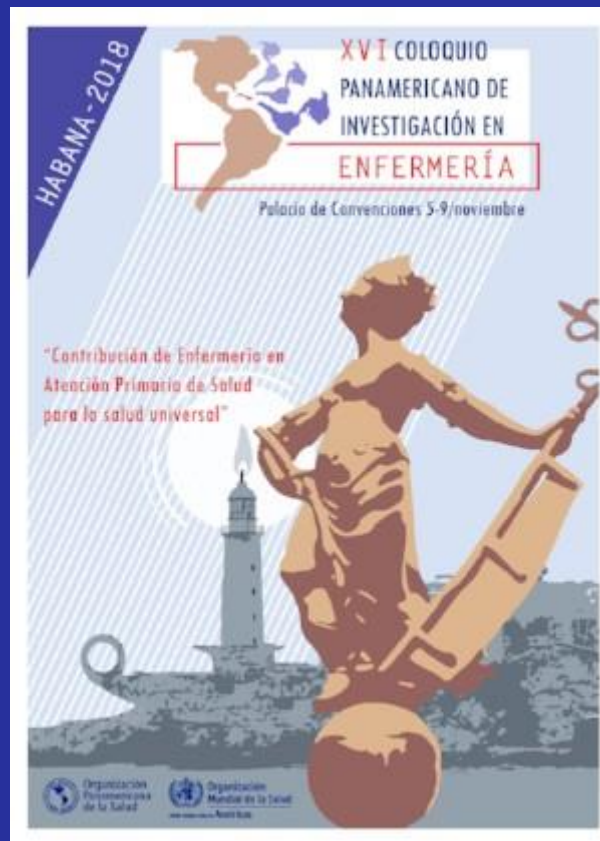

### **Publication by Veryan Richards "The importance of language in mental health care"**

A publication by Veryan Richards on the importance of shaping language as a constructive tool in mental health care.

Used in a constructive manner, language can have a substantial impact on people's lives. In the context of mental illness, mental health, and wellbeing, negative words can be experienced as condescending, isolating, and stigmatising, whereas positive words can convey dignity, empathy, and hope. Colleen Vojak comments, "When used indiscriminately, words can create barriers, misconceptions, stereotypes and labels that are difficult to overcome. Labels can promote separateness and isolation while promoting hierarchical

power differentials.”<sup>1</sup> Examples of this language use in the context of psychiatry are shown in the panel.

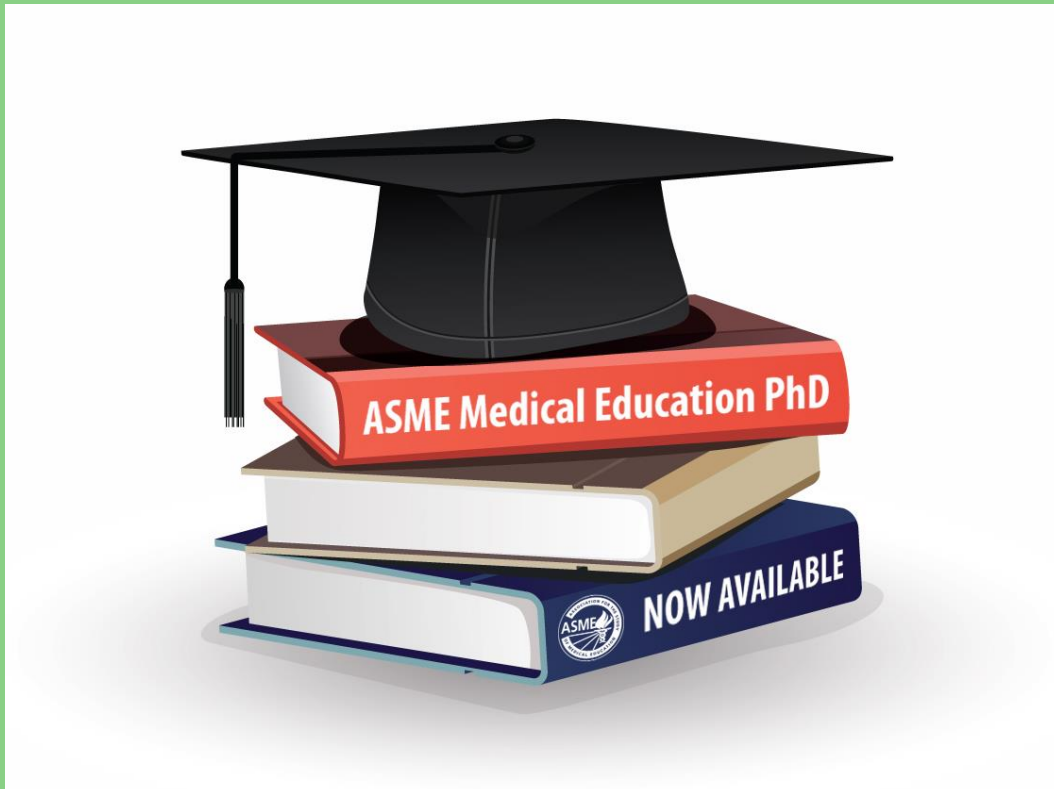

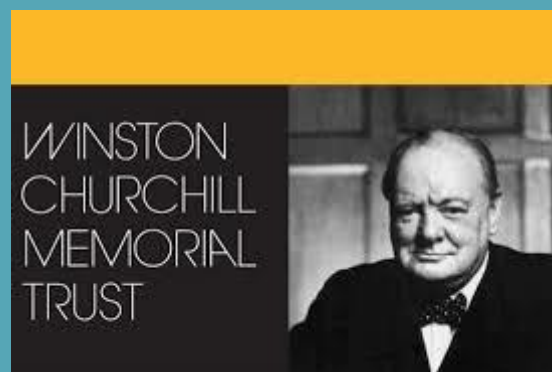
The studentship is expected to commence from January 2019 but there would be some flexibility for the right candidate.

### **Summary of event**

Lord Lansley introduced the morning by emphasising the importance of patient safety, responding to need rather than to targets, and the necessity of long term NHS funding. In addition he stated in this context the importance of what happens before the court process.

### **Synopsis of significant points**

**Whistleblowing in the NHS– Sir Robert Francis.**

There is too much pressure on staff and bullying in the workplace and this must be addressed to enable staff to be free to raise concerns. There is evidence that with the introduction in each trust of "Guardians of Freedom to Speak Up", progress is being made. Students and trainees are important in this context. The present climate of greater openness in the NHS may be contributing to a feeling of crisis and in addition we now hear about problems that previously would not have been raised.

The fear of prosecution and disciplinary action needs to be addressed. The public need to have confidence and knowledge that proper processes are in place before a non-blame culture can be developed– this includes a blame free investigation and knowledge that remedial actions will be introduced with involvement of the public.

**Getting it Right First Time– Professor Tim Briggs.**

There is a significant variation of Health care outcomes nationally and the use of good evidence drives good practice. Sharing and working with outcome data of trusts nationally has been shown to reduce litigation and reduce unnecessary medical interventions improving quality and outcomes for patients. For this to occur the process must be clinically led, data driven and involve teams in implementation.

**Learning from Claims– Helen Vernon NHS Resolution.**

The NHS has 163,000 claims on its books at the present time. An excess of £60 billion is being held from the NHS to pay for the provision for current and future claims arising from incidents which have already happened. At the worst this can be seen as a cost of an insurance for doing business but at its very best is an opportunity for a whole system approach to right what went wrong. In summary individual experiences are not something that should be just taken into the legal world but something that we all ought to learn from wherever we work in order to improve safety.

**The next steps for policy– Jeremy Hunt.**

We should give our support to patient safety in the developing world with recognition of the importance of universal health coverage as stated by the WHO.

He gave several examples of how the danger of hierarchy can influence patient safety and how we can learn from the experience of flight crews.

He then stated that the expensive care does not necessarily have the best health care outcomes and gave the examples of St Richard's Chichester and Salford Royal as trusts with outstanding outcomes nationally that have remained in financial surplus

He strongly believes that the NHS is succeeding with regard to safety, quality and standards. We should be proud of this.

He concluded by quoting the Commonwealth Fund which said that the UK has the best health care system in Europe and the safest in the world. However even in our system we have 150 preventable deaths each week and so we still must improve. We must learn more from the success of the airline industry in this context and be open and transparent moving from a blame to a learning culture.

**My conclusions for the event were:**

1. The NHS is slowly changing from a blame to a learning culture but has a long way to go.
2. The importance of supporting NHS staff and helping them to be resilient.
3. Patients need to be involved from the beginning in any system improvements and/or any "remedial" learning activities.
4. Independent investigators from outside trusts need to investigate unnecessary deaths.
5. Caution about the optimism expressed by some political speakers about the present state of the NHS.
6. Concern about the lack of awareness, recognition and acknowledgement by most expert panel members about the importance of effective IPE and collaborative working in addressing patient safety issues.
